Youth Speaks 2019




On January 16th our club ran the local heats for this public speaking competition. Teams of 3 (a chairperson, a proposer and a person to give the vote of thanks) speak to a topic of their choice. There were three senior teams, two from Romsey School and one from the Oasis Academy at Scholing in Southampton together with intermediate teams from Romsey and Mount batten Schools. The subjects were as diverse as "My fridge is going to rule the

world" to "What is the place for music in today's society?". The senior winners were Romsey A (Carys Davies, Katie Chant and Ellie East) on the subject of "Like a Girl" and the Intermediate winners were Mountbatten (Grace French, Megan Robinson and Daniel Galam) on "How can a book change your life?".

The winning teams went on to compete in the Wessex District final in Southampton on March 9th and we are very pleased to announce that Romsey A were winners of the Senior category and competed in the SW Regional final held in Taunton, Somerset on March 30th. Several Club members headed West to support them. Sadly they did not win but we congratulate them on their success.

On Wednesday 13th March 88 students were faced with a train derailment and spillage of hazardous waste. Fortunately not a real world problem but this year's task set by Rotary in the 2019 Young Technologist Tournament.

The students from Bitterne Park, Hamble, Mountbatten, Oasis Academy Scholing, Regents Park, Romsey and Woodlands schools all met at Romsey's Crosfield Hall. To solve this rather delicate task of recovering the hazardous waste (simulated by a plastic cylinder) the teams were asked to construct a crane which could be pushed along the track, recover the cylinder and return to

the start line. The materials to solve this tricky problem were nothing more than bits of wood, elastic bands, a few pulleys, an electric motor plus string, glue and a magnetic hook.

When construction time was over the teams had to demonstrate their devices under the scrutiny of the judges who were Rotary members with engineering backgrounds and from local hi-tech engineering companies: Caroline Upton, Dr Patricia Roberts and Ali Ewida. Most teams succeeded in producing a working crane.

While the judges retired to make their decisions the teachers' team which had been set the advanced version of the task demonstrated their design prowess. They fulfilled the advanced task with some aplomb.

The winning schools were :-

Foundation level: Mountbatten B with Bitterne Park B runners up

Intermediate level: Bitterne Park team A with Oasis Scholing A runners up.

The teams received their crystal trophies from Rotary District Governor Allan Smith. Earlier in the day the Mayor of Romsey, Councillor Dorothy Baverstock had enjoyed a morning visit and had shown great interest in the teams' progress.

This annual Technology Tournament is run nationally by a central Rotary group and now we look forward to see what test of ingenuity they dream up for next year.

Working towards peace and conflict resolution



PEACEJAM YOUTH CONFERENCE

9-10 March 2019, University of Winchester Nobel Peace Laureate Betty Williams



The University of Winchester hosted an event called Peace Jam in early March. The main aim of the annual event is to introduce teenagers to the issues surrounding conflict resolution both in their own interactions with each other and on the international stage. Each year the event invites a Nobel Peace

Laureate to play a leading role and this year it was Betty Williams. Betty played a key role in promoting peace and reconciliation in Northern Ireland. We supported 13 students from Mountbatten and Romsey Schools and several of our members went to Winchester to hear Betty's talk.

Know Your Blood Pressure Day



Each April since 2013 we have linked with the Stroke Association and the Local Opengate Stroke Club to take part in the national Know Your Blood Pressure day. This year on April 13th we persuaded 87 Romsey shoppers to be checked by qualified healthcare professionals.

Each year we find a significant number of people who had blood pressure readings that were higher than normal and so might be expected to be at higher risk of a debilitating or, in the worst case, fatal stroke. This year a surprisingly high number (39) fell into this category and were recommended to see their GP for further investigation. Seven had high enough readings that they were advised to have a follow up within a week. We hope that through this campaign we may helped people to avoid a stroke.

Know your Blood Pressure – related events

- 1. The week after our event in Romsey we had an inspirational talk from stroke survivor Liam Stapleton "From Stroke to Marathon". Liam had a stroke in 2014 whist waiting for a flight home from Austria after a ski holiday. He is now 54 and following superb hospital care in Southampton, a regime of weight loss (from 16 to 12 stone) and rehabilitation with help from the Winchester University Sports Dept he is now running marathons. His message to us was that strokes are, to a large extent, avoidable through changes in lifestyle.
- 2. Each year we do the blood pressure measuring in a tent of the type used by Shelterbox to provide emergency shelter and life support equipment in areas of natural disaster. We are enthusiastic supporters of this charity and sent funding for a Shelterbox immediately following the cyclone disaster in Southern Africa.

Raising awareness of Polio - and of Rotary





Last autumn we entered a partnership with the Sir Harold Hiller Gardens to raise awareness of Rotary's efforts in partnership with the World Health Organisation and Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to eradicate the crippling disease polio. As we reported last autumn we helped to plant a field of 250,000 purple crocuses at Hilliers; the purple colour recalling the purple dye that marks the fingers of vaccinated children.

In March hundreds of people flocked to the Gardens to see the spectacle and among them was Allan Smith, the leader of Rotary in the Wessex region (covering Hampshire, Wiltshire, Dorset, Isle of Wight and Channel Islands). Allan had recently returned from Delhi where a Rotary group had been doing polio vaccinations. He said how impressed he was with the purple display and with the way the partnership with Hilliers had been developed by Rotary members, Sandy Dunn, Stewart Mitchell and John Gould. He hoped that as the partnership matures it will gain international recognition through Rotary's

worldwide network.

To add to the "Purple for Polio" theme, Romsey Abbey tower was a floodlit purple beacon shining over the town.


to be provided.
